

FACT SHEET The D-Day Invasion at Normandy - June 6, 1944

Invasion Date June 6, 1944 - The D in D-Day stands for "day" since the final invasion date

was unknown and weather dependent.

Allied Forces More than 150,000 Allied troops from the United States, the United

Kingdom, Canada, Free France and Norway.

Invasion Area The Allied code names for the beaches along the 50-mile stretch of

Normandy coast targeted for landing were Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword. Omaha was the costliest beach in terms of Allied casualties.

The Outcome By June 11, with the beachheads firmly secured, more than 326,000 Allied

troops had crossed with more than 100,000 tons of military equipment. Paris was liberated on August 25. Germany surrendered on May 8, 1945.

Veterans Today The number of remaining WWII veterans is estimated at just under 500,000.

There is no official resource for how many D-Day veterans remain with us

today.
