

#### INTRODUCTION

Sometimes, finding a recycling bin can be a real maze! This is a fun activity that encourages students to be more aware of where recycling bins are located across their schools and communities. Now, they'll always know a spot to toss water bottles and newspapers.

## **MATERIALS**

- + Maze example and template worksheet
- + Magnet
- + Paperclip

#### **PROCEDURES**

- 1. Have your students draw a maze on paper and use a magnet and paperclip to traverse the maze and get the paperclip to the end (a recycling bin). Use the included example as a demonstration of the activity.
- 2. Students can trade mazes with other students to try them out.
- 3. For homework, have your students list on the back where there are recycling bins in the school, in the neighborhood, and in their homes.


