Dear Graduates and Friends of West Point,

In late 1944, few Allied leaders thought a massive German counterattack could be possible. Rome fell on June 5, and, one day later, the greatest amphibious invasion in history brought nearly 160,000 men to the shores of Normandy on D-Day. By the end of August, French and American soldiers were marching through the streets of Paris. Hitler's "Atlantic Wall" had been breached, and the Allies were rushing toward the German border on the road to Berlin. As Christmas approached, the Allied forces in Europe felt the war was nearing its end. But on December 16, that optimism vanished suddenly. The supposedly impossible German counterattack was here—and it was larger than anyone could have anticipated. With more than 200,000 German assault troops poised to push into the Ardennes, and another 800,000 in reserve, the next five weeks tested the limits of our troops.

I invite you to join The National WWII Museum on a comprehensive tour of significant battles that took place in the fall and winter of 1944, events crucial to the Allies' eventual victory on the long and grueling road to Berlin. This all-new itinerary is custom curated by historians in the Jenny Craig Institute for the Study of War and Democracy and brought to life by our own Educational Travel Team. Expertly researched here at the Museum in New Orleans and led by expert local guides in Europe, this is the most immersive tour of the Hürtgen and Ardennes regions available today. From Aachen, tour the Hürtgen Forest and learn more about the series of battles fought here from September to December 1944. Next, enter into the Bastogne corridor and the Luxembourg Ardennes, tracing the routes of the last major German offensive in the West. Encounter the heroic stories of the American soldiers who won the largest and costliest campaign fought by the US Army in World War II.

Anyone who has read or watched *Band of Brothers* by Museum founder Stephen E. Ambrose knows of the swirling snow, the bitter cold, and the murderous nature of the German onslaught. HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

PATTON'S 4TH ARMORED DIVISION AND THE "FIRECALL" TO BASTOGNE

After Brigadier General Anthony McAuliffe famously rejected the German demand to surrender, clearer weather allowed the besieged GIs in Bastogne to receive airborne supply drops on December 23–24. Allied aircraft also bombed surrounding German troop concentrations. In retaliation, the Germans launched their own nighttime bombings of Bastogne. By the 26th, General George S. Patton's 4th Armored Division had postured for a breakthrough of Bastogne from the south.

Three 4th Armored Division combat commands began pushing north toward Bastogne from the towns of Martelange, Witre, and Neufchâteau, facing stiff resistance from the German 5th Parachute Division. Combat Command R (CCR), including the 37th Tank Battalion, achieved the final breakthrough. Led by Lieutenant Colonel Creighton Abrams, the most famous American tank commander of World War II and future Chief of Staff of the US Army, the battalion's 20 remaining tanks attempted the planned final breakthrough through Remichampagne and Clochimont. By 3:00 p.m. on the 26th, with daylight fading, the 37th Tank Battalion scrapped the planned attack toward the northwest town of Sibret and instead opted for a direct push north to Assenois, just a mile away. With Bastogne only three miles beyond Assenois, the besieged 101st Airborne soldiers received word that American tanks were advancing from the south along the Assenois road.

Eight C Company Sherman tanks, followed by half-tracks, led the charge. At 4:45 p.m., First Lieutenant Charles P. Boggess Jr., commanding the lead tank *Cobra King*, initiated an artillery strike on Assenois and charged forward in the assault. German defenders mounted stiff resistance, and hand-to-hand fighting erupted. Despite this, Boggess pressed forward through the town, firing 22 shots from *Cobra King*'s 75mm main gun in quick succession. Along with four other Sherman tanks and a half-track, the lead element of the 37th Tank Battalion pushed north through Assenois.

Upon reaching the last German strongpoint outside Bastogne, a green-painted pillbox, *Cobra King* fired three rounds from its 75mm gun, killing the final German defenders. Just 100 yards beyond the pillbox, Boggess shouted into the darkness, "Come here! This is the 4th Armored." After a brief pause, a figure came forward and stated, "I'm Lieutenant Webster of the 326th Engineers, 101st Airborne Division. Glad to see you." Within 30 minutes, Abrams advanced up through Assenois, and McAuliffe arrived at the outpost to offer greetings. With this linkup, the siege of Bastogne ended.

TOUR HIGHLIGHTS

Bastogne

Visit Bastogne, where American forces withstood the German counteroffensive during the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944. Surrounded and facing brutal winter conditions, the 101st Airborne Division and elements of Patton's Third Army helped turn the tide of the Battle of the Bulge. Tour Bastogne Barracks, a former command post that now serves as a museum and vehicle restoration site. Pay respects at the graves of Belgian nurses Renée Lemaire, who was killed during the bombardment, and Augusta Chiwy, who treated wounded American soldiers. This stop offers a clear look at the challenges, resilience, and human cost of the Ardennes campaign.

Langer Family Farmhouse

Visit the former Langer family farmhouse near Wereth, Belgium, where 11 African American soldiers from the 333rd Field Artillery Battalion spent the final night of their lives during the Battle of the Bulge. After becoming separated from their unit, the soldiers—now known as the Wereth 11—were welcomed with compassion and offered food and shelter by the Langer family. Tragically, the men were soon captured, tortured, and executed by German SS troops, likely after being reported by a local resident. This visit offers an opportunity to honor the memory of the Wereth 11, learn their names, and reflect on the courageous efforts of the Langer family to assist them in their final hours.

Luxembourg American Cemetery

Visit the Luxembourg American Cemetery, where over 5,000 US servicemembers are buried—many of whom fought in the Battle of the Bulge. Walk among the graves of infantrymen, tankers, medics, and airmen who gave their lives during the brutal winter campaign. The cemetery also includes the gravesite of General George S. Patton, commander of the US Third Army. Reflect at the chapel and memorial wall inscribed with the names of the missing. This stop offers a solemn tribute to the cost of victory and the legacy of American sacrifice in Europe.

Edwin Popken Military Historian and Battlefield Guide

Edwin Popken has studied World War II for more than 25 years and has led guided tours to both famous and lesser-known battlefields throughout Europe. His area of expertise focuses on Allied operations in Northwestern Europe between September 1944 and March 1945. A regular guide on the Museum's Easy Company: From England to the Eagle's Nest tours, Popken has escorted guests from around the world to sites made significant during Operation Market Garden, the

Battle of the Hürtgen Forest, and the Battle of the Bulge. Popken holds a master's degree in military history from the University of Birmingham in the United Kingdom and is a member of the International Guild of Battlefield Guides, Guild Badge No. 93.

Joris Nieuwint Military Historian and Battlefield Guide

A lifelong resident of the Netherlands, Joris Nieuwint brings nearly three decades of in-depth study and personal passion to every battlefield tour he leads. Since 2012, Nieuwint has guided countless individuals, families of veterans, school groups, military units, and history enthusiasts across some of Europe's most significant WWII sites. Nieuwint offers deeply engaging tours supported by historical maps, rare photos, aerial imagery, and multimedia

elements, providing both the strategic overview and the human stories behind the battles.



Battle of the Bulge

Roland Gaul Military Historian, Battlefield Guide, and Founder of the National Museum of Military History in Luxembourg

Born in Diekirch, Luxembourg, Roland Gaul has collected Battle of the Bulge artifacts since childhood. Growing up with the remains of one of history's largest land battles in his backyard, Gaul developed a keen interest in military history at a young age. A graduate of the Diekirch Lycée Classique, Gaul continued his studies at the Royal Military Academy (ERM) in Brussels, Belgium. In 1982, he

founded the Diekirch Historical Society and the Diekirch Historical Museum, which became the National Museum of Military History in 1993. A scholar, lecturer, historian, consultant, and author of several books, including the field guide *Battle of the Bulge in Luxembourg*, Gaul has led many tours in the Ardennes over his 30 years as a guide for international audiences. He has also served as a consultant on many Battle of the Bulge films and documentaries.



Battle of the Bulge

Robin Laing | *Band of Brothers* Actor, Pvt. Edward "Babe" Heffron

Born in Dundee, Scotland, Robin Laing grew up in the fishing and golf towns of Arbroath and Carnoustie. After studying drama, he landed his first acting job playing Renton in the stage adaptation of Irvine Welsh's *Trainspotting*. Many more roles were to follow, including the lead role of Phil McCann in John Byrne's film *The Slab Boys* and Major MacDonald in *Outlander*, as well as shows such as *Shetland*, *The Victim*, and, most recently, *The Gold*. In 2000, Laing was cast

as Private Edward J. "Babe" Heffron in the HBO miniseries *Band of Brothers*, which follows the lives and achievements of the 101st Airborne's Easy Company during World War II. He had no idea that this eight-month job would have such a profound effect on his life and lead to lifelong friendships, not only with his fellow cast members, but also with the veterans on whom the series was based and their families.

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

STAVELOT

One of the most brutal war crimes committed by German forces during the Battle of the Bulge occurred in the Belgian town of Stavelot. As part of the Ardennes Offensive, *Kampfgruppe Peiper* pushed through the region in an attempt to capture key road junctions. In their path, they encountered civilians who were either suspected of aiding the Allies or simply caught in the chaos of war. On December 18–19, 1944, SS troops systematically executed more than 130 Belgian civilians, including men, women, and children. Many were shot in their homes, while others were herded into buildings and gunned down in cold blood.

This massacre was part of the wider pattern of atrocities committed by the Waffen-SS during the offensive, reflecting their disregard for the rules of war. The killings in Stavelot were not isolated; they mirrored the infamous Malmedy Massacre, in which American prisoners of war were slaughtered by *Kampfgruppe Peiper*. The violence in Stavelot was fueled by the German belief that civilians were assisting US forces, but it also demonstrated the brutality of the Nazi regime as they fought desperately to regain the initiative. After the battle, these war crimes were investigated, and many of those responsible were later tried and convicted at the Dachau Trials. Today, Stavelot remembers these tragic events with memorials honoring the innocent lives lost.

During the Battle of the Bulge, Major General Troy Middleton gained fame for his decision to hold the key crossroads town of Bastogne as German forces advanced around it. A distinguished WWI veteran, Middleton came out of retirement to serve in World War II. He served for 480 days in combat—more than any other American general—and retired again in 1945. He later served as president of Louisiana State University.

FROM THE COLLECTION:

THE C-47 SKYTRAIN

Displayed prominently in Louisiana Memorial Pavilion at The National WWII Museum in New Orleans, the Museum's C-47 Skytrain stands as a testament to the Allied airborne and logistical power that helped shape the outcome of World War II. Built in 1944 by the Douglas Aircraft Company in Oklahoma City, this C-47 was a military adaptation of the civilian DC-3 airliner. With a cargo capacity of 6,000 pounds or room for 18 to 22 fully equipped paratroopers, the C-47 became the backbone of Allied airlift operations across every theater of war.

The aircraft on display, Serial No. 42-93096, has been restored with the markings that were used to denote Allied aircraft that participated in the main US airborne assault on D-Day, when "096" dropped pathfinders to mark the landing zones for the airborne drop. On June 6, 1944, hundreds of C-47s carried paratroopers of the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions into Normandy, initiating one of the largest airborne operations in history. These aircraft also towed gliders loaded with jeeps, howitzers, and medical teams behind German lines. The C-47's role in D-Day has rightly become iconic—but its importance only grew in the months that followed.

During the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944, the C-47 proved critical again. As American forces—including the 101st Airborne—were surrounded in the Belgian town of Bastogne, foul weather grounded most aircraft, and the enemy cut off traditional means of resupply on the ground. When skies finally cleared on December 23, C-47s from the IX Troop Carrier Command of the US Ninth Air Force flew dozens of low-level airdrop missions, delivering tons of urgently needed supplies: food, ammunition, blankets, fuel, and medical gear. During this mission, "096" sustained minor damage from German ground fire, but the plane was repaired and placed back in service in a matter of days. Despite German flak and ground fire, these crews helped sustain the defenders until Patton's Third Army broke the siege three days later.

Purchased by the Museum in 2006 and now displayed with a restored interior, the Museum's C-47 offers visitors a tangible link to the airborne missions that changed the course of the war. From the hedgerows of Normandy to the frozen woods of Bastogne, the Skytrain was a lifeline—its rumble overhead a sign that help was on the way.

This exclusive pre-tour sets the stage for an in-depth exploration of Operation Market Garden, the ambitious but ill-fated Allied campaign to secure key bridges in the Netherlands in September 1944. Journey through Belgium and the Netherlands with expert Dutch tour guide Edwin Popken, visiting key battle sites, memorials, and museums that bring this pivotal operation to life.

Start in Brussels and trace the path of the British XXX Corps as they advanced toward Eindhoven, with touring stops at Joe's Bridge—the starting point of the attack—and the Liberation Garden Museum for an insightful introduction to the campaign. Along the way, explore various locations where paratroopers of the storied 101st and 82nd Airborne Divisions landed, fought, and held their positions against fierce German counterattacks. Key stops include Son Bridge, Grave Bridge, the Heumen Lock, and the intense battle site at Mook, where the Germans nearly cut off the Allied advance.

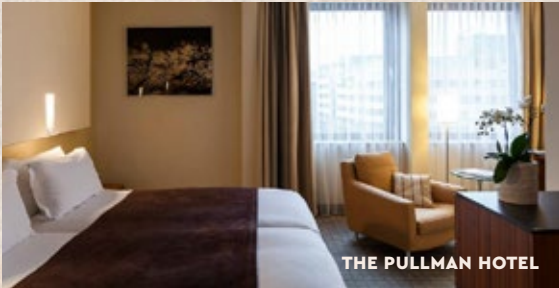
